The conversation turned in a different direction, as she pulled a book out of her bag. She didn't know how to properly site the book she was going through for this assignment on her daily reading log. The book was her Catholic Daily Missal. This being post Palm Sunday, she was reading the story of Jesus' death and resurrection out of the Book of John.

She had to write down what the story was about on the log. And right there, I found myself talking about Jesus in a public school with four kids totally dialed in as the young girl was talking about scripture. It was a great moment as we talked about how this Easter story related to her grandfather!

This was soon interrupted, as most conversations are with 4th grade girls, by another girl talking about how she was celebrating the Laos New Year at her temple that very week. We talked for awhile about what that meant to her and how important it was to her family.

Here were two girls from two totally different cultures and religious backgrounds sharing with each other at Homework Club in the local elementary school. I left them to get back to reading and shook my head in amazement.
